1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Arts and Commerce College, Ashta was started in June 1965 by Kasegaon Education Society. The college is a part of reputed educational institute having including colleges providing professional education in engineering and technology, management, pharmacy, nursing, and agriculture. It is a grant-in-aid college affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Having completed two Cycles of Accreditation it has been re-accredited by NAAC with B Grade in January 2011. The Institution constantly strives to upgrade its infrastructure to meet the challenges of a technology driven environment and to meet the demands of the curriculum. Since its inception in 1965, the college has provided higher education to students of rural area, being the only college in this area imparting higher education in Arts and Commerce streams. The BCA stream was added to the college in 2007. The motto of the mother institution is followed by the college, viz. “Sarvahi Tapasa Sadhyam”, i.e. one can achieve everything through hard work combined with perseverance. The college has a vision, mission and goals set for imparting higher education to the students in this area and the vicinity.

We strive to make the students from rural area competent enough in all respects such as educational, rational, social, technological and economical through excellence in academic and value-based education.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The Institution focuses upon the goals and objectives in order to disseminate quality education to all the students, especially to socio-economically under-privileged students. With this mission, the institution offers six UG programs and five PG, including self financing (C.O.C.) and add on courses such as Banking and other competitive examinations.

Since the College is affiliated to Shivaji University, academic flexibility is subject to University norms. During the last five years, five faculty of our college have worked on various academic bodies and sub-committees constituted for restructuring of the syllabi of different subjects of the University. A number of national, international and state level workshops, seminars and conferences have been attended by faculty members. The workshops and seminars sponsored by the University through the Board of Studies help to orient the teachers to the revised syllabi and question paper pattern. The University sends notices and circulars to the institution to keep it abreast of the latest developments and changes in the syllabi and the pattern of question papers. The faculty has an access to the University library. The institution has organized workshops and seminars on revised the syllabi and significant current issues.

The college has a rich library with latest reference works, encyclopedias, rare books, periodicals, journals. Guest lectures are conducted to create an interface between the students and experts from academic, industrial, and financial institutions. The heads of the various departments monitor the teaching of the departmental members to ensure that the syllabus is covered in the stipulated period.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Admissions to various courses are given according to the University/Government rules. The merit list of students who get admission is displayed on the Notice board, bringing transparency in the admission process.

The learning experience of the students is enriched through activities such as group discussions, guest lectures, seminars, project work, study tours, study visits, surveys on social and agricultural issues, data collection and preparation of reports and Wall Papers. The college thus undertakes efforts to make higher education 'student centric'.

Use of audio-visual aids like L.C.D., Models, Charts, CDs, VCDs and other resources has increased over the years. The language laboratory helps to enhance communication skills of the students.

U.G. and P.G. courses have semester pattern of examination, with 10 marks each in the fifth and sixth semester for Third Year students as a part of internal evaluation. Examinations are conducted according to the examination schedule of the University. Assessment of first year degree courses is done at college level. P.G. courses have 20 marks in each semester as a part of internal evaluation. The student enters signature in front of the column of marks, making the system transparent.

The three year degree course of BCA has five subjects of 80 marks for theory and 20 marks for internal evaluation. Out of 20 marks 5 are allotted to attendance, 5 to Test and 10 to Assignment. The sixth subject is practical oriented with journal and project, including viva assessed by the university. Evaluation of first year is done by the college.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The College has promoted research culture by constituting a Research Committee that encourages the faculty and also the students to undertake Research Projects, and motivates the faculty to prepare and present Research papers at State, National and International level. The faculty is also motivated to update their professional development by attending State, National and International level seminars and conferences. The Research Committee shares information about the proposed conferences, seminars and workshops with the staff. As a result of all these efforts, there is a considerable rise in research activity in the post-accreditation phase. At present three faculty are acting as Research Supervisors. Five Minor Research Projects have been undertaken and submitted by the faculty. Four faculty have completed Orientation and Refresher courses. The College has organized 24 faculty development programs, whereas our faculty have attended 402 workshops, seminars and conferences at State, National and International levels during the last six years.

During the last six years various outreach programs have been organized by the College. The major outreach programs include disaster management and need based programs. As a consequence, our college has received four awards for outstanding extension and outreach programs. Our faculty is also duly rewarded for their contribution in these activities. Principal Dr. Vilas Kale and Dr. Ram Naik are recipients of Best Distance Centre Award. Our college conducts a number of outreach programs in collaborations with NGOs, GOs, institutions and agencies such as Giants Club, Save the Children India, Local Self Government bodies at the rural level.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has a wide and eco-friendly campus of 40 acres and 29 gunthas which is helpful in conducting various curricular and extra-curricular activities. The college has adequate infrastructure facilities with sufficient number of class-rooms, library, reading room, laboratories, play-ground, indoor stadium, outdoor stadium, auditorium, Ladies Hostel, girls' common room, staff room etc. The existing infrastructure is being utilized optimally.

The maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure is regularly monitored and is done on contract basis as per requirement. The college Library has more than 53000 books, 50 Journals and Periodicals and 10 news-papers. The Library provides computers with Internet facility and Audio-Video cassette borrowing facility to students and faculty. Library services have been partially computerized. The college has an up-to-date computer laboratory as well as language laboratory which are utilized by staff and students. The college provides a class room to Netaji Probodhini for conducting coaching classes for competitive examinations. Many students of the college have benefitted by attending these coaching classes.

The college provides necessary infrastructure and equipments in order to encourage more participation of students in sports and cultural activities. The college has a spacious ground with 400 meter track that is utilized by the students as well as people from the vicinity. The ground is used for practicing by the college students as well as students of other institutions who appear for competitive examinations like the Police Force and allied services. In addition to this, matches are held by different organizations and institutions.

Student Support and Progression

The socio-economic profile indicates that college caters to the needs of socio-economically deprived students

coming from rural area, thus justifying the vision and mission of the institution. Four career oriented courses along with add-on courses and skill development are provided to the students. Counseling and guidance is provided for enhancing the progression and to reduce drop-out rate of the students. The value-added courses are conducted to develop life skills. The Alumni Association contributes to the growth and development of the institution. The college has a Student Council that is comprised of students who are first in merit in the class. Four other students including two girls are also nominated by the Principal who belong to four departments viz. Sports, NSS, NCC and Department of Cultural Activities. These students are members of various committees constituted for a smooth functioning of the college. Students' Council is basically the representation of the student community in the college, working as an interface between the students and the administration. The student council helps the students to develop their skills of good governance. The members of the student council work in the institutional committees such as 'Students Redressal Committee, Anti Ragging Committee, Sexual Atrocities Prevention Committee, Ladies Hostel Committee etc.'

The College encourages the students to participate in extra-curricular activities including sports and games. As a result, the students have won prizes at Zonal, Inter zonal and State level. Our NCC cadets have participated in State and National Level Camps.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Under the guidance and foresight of the Management, the institution prepares the annual plan regarding academic administrative and developmental aspects of the institution, which are in keeping with the goals and mission of the institution. The institution has organizational structure necessary for its effective and smooth running through decentralization of authority and responsibilities.

Co-ordination and harmony between the departments and administrative process of the institution is brought about by the IQAC. Care is taken to involve all the stake-holders in planning through their active participation, advice and support. The feedback of students helps in improvement of faculty performance and addition of aspects of teaching and learning process.

With its large natural eco-friendly premises, the institution is willing to undertake further expansion.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The active participation of IQAC has improvised the quality in the academic and administrative systems. Through the participation of faculty in quality enhancement programs, the new ideas and developments have been incepted in the institution. The Kasegaon Education Society monitors its academic and infrastructural development rigorously.

The programs for personality development, life skills development and value addition have been effectively internalized. So, the unity and integrity is found in all stake-holders. The elections of secretary of students council have been declared unopposed for last few years. The college promotes the social responsibilities and citizenship roles among students by organizing community-oriented programs.

The college has sent Annual Quality Assurance Reports (AQAR) for last five years and has complied with all the recommendations in the previous assessment report in a planned manner.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1

The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The college, being affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur, takes various steps towards effectively delivering the curriculum.

- Faculty member submits a teaching plan at the beginning of the semester to the HOD. After discussion on this, it is submitted to the Principal.
- An academic calendar is prepared which is monitored by Principal.
- Every department submits an activity plan that is reviewed semester wise.
- The progress of the department is maintained through unit tests, seminars, presentations.
- The Principal conducts a meeting with faculty members at the beginning and end of every semester to assess the progress of curriculum.
- Time table is prepared well in advance before the commencement of each semester.
- Student's feedback of Faculty is taken every year. The Principal is given a report of this feedback and he gives the required instructions to the Faculty.

The workshops and seminars sponsored by the University through the Board of Studies help to orient the teachers to the revised syllabi and question paper pattern. From time to time the University sends notices and circulars to the institution so that they are kept abreast of developments in the curriculum. Teachers have access to the University library and the University website is also browsed extensively by the Faculty in order to keep themselves abreast of information on curriculum. With the help of a strong network with various subject teachers associations like Shivaji University Commerce and Management Teachers Association, Shivaji University Bhugol Shikshak Sangh, Shivaji University Marathi Shikshak Sangh, Shivaji University Economics Association, Shivaji University English Teachers Association, Shivaji University History Association, we have organized workshops and seminars regarding the syllabus as well as current issues.

Teachers are encouraged by the institution to attend seminars. The College hosts workshops for implementation of syllabus and seminars on related issues. College library provides latest references, books, periodicals to the faculty for the development of curriculum. The Institution constantly strives to upgrade its infrastructure to meet the challenges of a technology driven environment and to meet the demands of the curriculum. Guest lectures are conducted to create an interface between the students and experts from academic, industrial, financial institutions.

- The organization of Study tours and visits help the students to understand the implementation of

theory in the real world.

- Certificate courses such as E-banking, Business Accounting, Tax Practices, Tourism and Spoken English are organized to supplement the degree course.
- The Institute conducts seminars and at least one workshop under lead college scheme every year for staff advancement.
- Students are given topics outside the syllabus to make Power Point Presentations which inculcates the habit of research.
- The Departments publish wall Papers and college publishes annual magazine in which students express their views.

The college is a part of reputed educational institute having seventy seven branches, from primary to higher education, including colleges providing professional education in engineering and technology, management, pharmacy, nursing, and agriculture. The interaction between faculty members and students helps in the implementation of the curriculum.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The college implements learning -teaching process in such a way that they become more and more student-centric. The college has provided adequate support structures to achieve the objectives. The sufficient number of classrooms with good quality black boards and comfortable benches are made available. Teachers are provided a laptop by the college. The laboratories for learning the subjects like Geography, English and BCA department are well equipped with necessary equipments, furniture, computers, charts, maps, software's, CDs, practical books and such relevant materials. The Language lab has also available. The college has a spacious and rich library with around fifty three thousand books. The reference books required for different subjects, relevant textbooks, periodicals, journals, volumes, encyclopedia and other literary books in different areas of knowledge are available in the library. For general reading newspapers, weeklies, monthlies, etc in English, Marathi and Hindi are made available. A separate reading room with comfortable chairs with a seating capacity of 100 students, tables, fans, sufficient light arrangement is available in the college for the students. A spacious and big hall is used for different academic, cultural and general activities. Academic seminars, workshops, conferences, symposiums, etc are conducted in this hall. Students are a part of different committees formed in the college. In addition, it is used to conduct cultural activities and general activities like arranging speeches of distinguished persons.

The academic activities such as Group Discussions, Role-Play, Question-Answer Sessions, poetry recitations, seminars, orals, etc are conducted to develop interactive learning skills among the students. Small group of students are made to write a project. Joint articles by students for wall-papers and annual magazine, Role Play, team events in sports, etc conducted in the college help to develop collaborative learning skills among the students. Our institution started add-on courses like banking classes for interested undergraduate and post-graduate student. Students learn through participation in curricular and extracurricular activities. Study tours by different department to deferent locations and study visits to industry, banks or financial institutes make the students aware of the practical issues. 'Avishkar' event organized by Shivaji University for help and promoted to develop the collaborative learning skills among the students. The NCC wing of the college is actively participated in many programme like Blood donation camp, Independence Day, Republic Day, NCC Day celebrated in the College. NCC cadets participated in many camps like Republic Day Camp, Thal Sainik Camp, National Integration Camp, Combine Annual Training Camp, Annual Training Camp, Army Attachment Camp, Shivaji Trail Trek, etc. In NCC our college introduced girl cadet from academic year 2016-2017. 2.3.4

Innovation and creativity in teaching-learning

Response:

The college continuously takes rigorous efforts to nurture the values of critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper. The ways and means followed by the college to nurture these values is a part of overall working of the college.

Some units of the syllabi are deal the values, criticism, scientific thinking, and creativity through these units. The teachers imbibe the art of thinking critically among the students. Students are expected to study some authors, thinkers, philosophers critically.

Some parts of syllabi focus on inculcating the values like thinking scientifically, logically and rationally among the students. Students are made aware importance of scientific temper, the need of eradication of superstition, secular outlook etc. Preparation for competitive examinations, Question-Answer Sessions, quiz, debate, etc is a few examples for developing scientific temper and critical thinking.

A platform is provided to the students by encouraging them to participate in State and University

level activities like *Avishkar* Research Competition and Youth Festival etc, college level activities like poetry recitations, Symposiums. It is pride a matter of to the college as it has been honored with different honors, prizes, trophies, certificates etc, at many competitions. Every year the players of the college are participating in different games at zonal, inter-zonal level and inter-university competitions.

In addition to them, the activities practiced by, B.C.A departments like programming, ad-mad show, projects and ingenious are helped to develop technological skill among the students. The college undertakes different activities like Projects, Group Discussions and Industrial Tours to enhance the creativity among the students.

The culture of nurturing the above values is implemented through co-curricular and extracurricular activities as well. The wallpaper presentation is a continuous activity in the college. Every department of the college is involved in this activity. The students of the departments are given a particular theme to write articles, to prepare posters, sketches, cartoons etc. The articles are written in English, Hindi and Marathi.

The annual magazine of the college *Lahar* is published at the end of every academic year and it is sent for competition at the university level. It includes articles, various types of literature such as poems, short stories, sketches and cartoons, etc. The concerned subject teachers guide the students in preparing the wallpapers and *Lahar* Magazine.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

a) UNIVERSITY REFORMS:

The institution has adopted the following major reforms of the university: The semester pattern of examination, for graduate and undergraduate levels, is introduced by the University from June 2010. The

evaluation/assessment work of the first year of each course in the college is assigned to the college from the academic year 2012-2013 as per the guidelines of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The answer books are evaluated/ assessed by the concerned subject teachers of the college. The result sheet is prepared at the college level only and sent to the university office for declaration of the result. The post-graduation evaluation work is carried out at the university campus.

b) Internal Evaluation:

The new pattern of internal evaluation like Seminars, Home Assignments, Project Works and Oral Tests are introduced to B.A, B.Com, B.C.A, M.A, and M.Com. The internal marks are sent by the college to the University which are included in the final mark list that is prepared by Shivaji University.

The Internal evaluation Pattern is introduced for the third year undergraduate students. It is also applied to the B.C.A course and postgraduate examinations. It follows 40:10 for undergraduate courses. 10 marks are allotted for seminars and project works, etc. 80:20 patterns are followed for post graduate examinations and B.C.A course. 20 marks are given for seminars, oral tests, project works and home assignments. 20 marks are allotted for internal evaluation of B.C.A course (three years). Marks are distributed as below:

Mid-term exam: 10 marks

Attendance: 5 marks

Assignments: 5 marks

c) INSTITUTIONAL REFORMS:

The college conducts various evaluation methods for students apart from university evaluation pattern:

Class/Unit Tests, Field Surveys, Writing reports of Village surveys (Geography department, Environment),

Study Tours of Geography, History, Commerce, BCA, Marathi, Hindi and English Departments arranged in the different part of the country.

Our college NSS Department organized every year special camp (Shram Seva Sanskar Camp) in the village adopted for conducting NSS activities. NSS and NCC Departments of the college send their volunteers and cadets for camp organized by NSS Department in Shivaji University and 16 Mah. BN NCC, Sangli

2.5.2

Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety**Response:**

The teachers of the college are required to take into consideration the attendance of the students, their participation in the activities such as group discussion, question answer sessions, seminars, orals etc. They are further advised to take efforts to enhance their confidence level, communication skills and inculcate the habit of supplementary reading for the subject under study. Students are recommended to read appropriate books and journals during the last six years. The college has followed the above practice for preparing the students for better performance.

It has helped to enhance the performance level of the students. The internal assessment work of the students is done by the teachers taking into account the above factors. A student feeling aggrieved in assessment is free to discuss it with the concerned teacher. If it is found that some injustice is done to him/her, it is rectified and thus transparency is maintained in the internal assessment process.

The institution made the following improvements in ensuring rigor and transparency in internal assessment during the last six years.

Every teacher explains the internal assessment procedure to the students at the beginning of every semester. The teachers decide the weightage to assess overall development of the students. The weightages vary from teacher to teacher. They are not mandatory from the university; but for the development of the students, teachers follow it. They are discussed in the classroom for transparency.

The weightages cover the following aspects:

- The attendance of the students
- Participation in the classroom discussion
- Participation in question-answer sessions
- Behavior in the classroom and the college campus
- Classroom attention
- Participation in cultural and academic activities

Some teachers ask the students to evaluate themselves and their performance. They discuss their assessment in the classroom. Thus transparency is maintained in the institution.

2.5.3**Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient****Response:**

A particular mechanism for Redressal of Grievances with reference to evaluation is followed at the college and university level.

College Level:

As laid down by the University, the department of examination is established in the college under the chairmanship of the Principal in keeping the guidelines of the university. The redressal of the grievances with reference to evaluation of Part I examination is done in the concerned department. The students, after getting their results, apply for the photocopy of the answer book, if they have grievances of less mark. The photocopy is given to them after . After that, the students confirm the answer book and submit the list of grievances such as under marking, unassessed answers, counting of marks and total of marks, etc. If needed, the department of examination invites the experts and re-evaluates the answer book. If the re-evaluation shows change in marks up to 10%, a new result is given to the students.

University level:

There is a Board of Examination body in the university to redress the grievances of the students in the context of evaluation. The following mechanism is established for the purpose:

Students apply for the photocopy

They fill Performa where the grievances are listed

Experts are appointed to examine the grievances

If the experts agree with the grievances, the examiner is invited to reassess the answer book

If the evaluation shows change in marks, the students are informed about it. The college and university maintain the transparent policy in this mechanism.

Response:

Teaching

The Academic Calendar of the college is prepared at the beginning of every Academic Year and published in the college prospectus. The distribution of the work of teaching is done in the departmental meetings. Taking into consideration the academic calendar the subject teachers prepare their teaching plans. The alternative plans, for the probable deviations to the teaching plans, due to unavoidable

reasons, are also thought over at the beginning of the academic year. The teaching plan includes the time schedule of Remedial Coaching for the reserved category students and for the slow learners also. The academic diary is maintained by every teacher throughout the year.

Learning:

The time tables for different classes are prepared in the beginning of the year. The study tours, industrial visits, field work and Event Management required for the concerned subjects are included in the teaching-learning plans. Projects, seminars, interactive teaching and group discussion are integral part of learning. These are also included in the teaching-learning plans. Lectures of eminent persons are organized to educate the student community. The teachers help the slow learners as well as extend guidance to the advanced learners. Students can contact the teachers for solving difficulties and for additional guidance.

Evaluation:

The evaluation schedule of the students is broadly divided into two parts: Internal Evaluation and External Evaluation. The University Authorities have prescribed guidelines for the internal evaluation of the students. These guidelines include the process of evaluation and the weightage in terms of marks. Internal Evaluation is done in the form of Oral, Project work, Seminar and Home Assignment for the classes. Definite weightage in the form of marks for a particular aspect of Internal Evaluation is also prescribed by the University. The Examination Committee of the college plans the yearly schedule of the internal evaluation process. The paper setting work is done at the University level and the rest of the work related to conduction of the examination is done at the college level. The evaluation of the answer books of first year students is done by the concerned subject teachers of the college. The evaluation reports are sent to the University Office for further process and declaration of the results.

The External Evaluation of the students includes assessment of the performance of the students in Theory, Practical and Viva- Voce of the Projects. The schedule of the External Evaluation is prepared by the University Authorities and conveyed to the colleges. The college follows the University schedules.

In the execution of the examination schedules the college makes available the services of teaching and non teaching staff, college classrooms and laboratories for conducting the examinations. The college deputs the concerned teachers when the services of the college teachers are required by the University for Assessment and evaluation at other centers.

Arts and Commerce College, Ashta is affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The college offers seven under graduate Programmes, five Post Graduate Programmes and five Career Oriented Courses. The syllabi of the seven U.G. and five P.G. Programmes are framed by the Board of Studies of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Some of our teachers have been members of Board of Studies and thus their contribution in the framing and structuring of syllabi is significant. There are above 150 courses (Papers) offered in the U.G. and P.G. Programmes. The syllabi of five Career Oriented Courses are framed by our faculty members. The Students and other stake holders get information of these Programmes and Courses from the Prospectus printed by the college before the beginning of the academic year and from the website of the college.

At the beginning of every academic year the Principal makes an Address to the first year students. In his address he tells the students about the Programme outcomes such as Critical Thinking, Effective Communication, Social Interaction, Effective Citizenship, National Integration, Ethics, Environment and Sustainability by giving a number of examples. In their respective classes the teachers give the prescribed syllabus of the course to the students and tell them about the course outcome. Likewise course outcomes and programme outcomes are available through syllabus in library. The course outcomes and the programme outcomes are displayed on the institutional website.

The university authorities like Board of Examinations, faculty, Board of Studies lay down the norms and the process for evaluation of students in different subjects of different classes. These are conveyed to the affiliated colleges on the university website.

The Management of the college and the Principal of the college monitor the implementation of syllabi, with changes, if any and the process of evaluation of the learners as provided by the university authorities from time to time.

The Principal of the college consistently keeps the subject teachers aware of the guidelines by the university about the process of evaluation with the changes, if any. The guidelines of the university are provided to the subject teachers. The teachers carefully study and understand the process of evaluation to

be followed and then evaluate the students. The information regarding evaluation process is kept ready for reference to all the students in the library of the college and displayed on the notice-board. As and when it becomes possible, the process of evaluation is informed to parents also through parents' meetings and at personal contact.

Subject wise workshops are organized for the subject teachers at the university level for making them aware of major changes in the process. Some authentic subject teachers' association also organizes, subject workshops as and when needed.

The college authorities take the following steps for the effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University.

Some teachers are deputed to attend workshops organized by university authorities and subject teachers' Associations. They convey this information to other teachers in the college. The guidelines issued by the university are made available in the library for the teachers and students. These are also displayed on the notice boards. There is an Examination Committee in the college. It deals with the effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university.

The college also initiates a few steps mentioned below for effective implementation of the evaluation reforms.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1

The institution has adequate facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

Response:

The college is located in Ashta and is spread over a campus of 40.29 acres. The college was established in 1965 and has adequate facilities and infrastructure for imparting higher education. The college has 24 class rooms, one ladies room, computerized administrative office, Principal's Cabin, Staff room, NCC office, NSS office, Auditorium, Seminar Hall, Language Lab, Computer Lab, Geography lab with two GPS, NAAC Cell, Examination Cell, Reference room, and a Study room with a capacity of more than 100 students, a Librarian's Cabin, fully automated library, a separate building for Department of BCA and Ladies Hostel, Indoor and Outdoor Stadium. In addition to this the college has adequate learning resources such as 73 computers with internet connection, 4 Broadband internet connections, 6 laptops, 4 projectors, 13 printers, one digital camera, 3 photocopy machines, and one heavy 15Kw Diesel Electricity Generator, ladies cycle parking shed and vehicle parking.

The college has a well equipped library updated up to 1st August, 2017. The library contains more than 53000 books including important volumes of Encyclopedias, reference books, Dictionaries, Reports and Educational CDs. It also has Integrated Library Management System to manage the interaction of books. The college library is very helpful for the students and faculty to enrich their knowledge. As far as the sports facilities are concerned there is a spacious playground along with a 400 meter, 8 lane South-North running track for the students, and an indoor stadium.

The NSS Office: It also has an office room as well as a store room. The office is 10x18sq.ft. It is used for NSS activities. The store room is used for storing utensils, equipment, carpets and other related articles required for annual camps.

The NCC office: There is an office room and store room. The NCC wing comprises of Infantry Unit attached to 16 Maharashtra Battalion and 5-Maharashtra Battalion girls unit.

Cultural Activities: The College extends support for stage set, door framework and all the theatre activities as per the requirement of the students.

Language Laboratory: The College has recently set up a language laboratory. It has 10+1 computers. The students who are interested in improving their communication skills in English are given training in this laboratory. This lab is used for developing communication skills among vernacular medium students as well as students who wish to develop their communication skills to an advanced level.

Health and Hygiene: The College is committed for complete physical, mental and social health of students and teachers on the campus. The college management takes proper care of health and hygiene in the college premises. In case of emergencies 'First Aid Kit' is available in the college office, Gymkhana, and Girls hostel. The college provides clean and cool drinking water through 6 installed water filters. In

the Ladies room Sanitary napkin vending machine has been installed. The College has a Canteen Committee that comprises of student representatives and teachers of the college. This committee ensures good quality food, hygiene and cleanliness of canteens and mess. The college canteen and ladies mess provides hygienic food to the students and staff. The College has outsourced the cleaning services of offices and college toilets to maintain cleanliness and hygiene of the college campus.

5.3.2

Presence of an active Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution

Response:

The college has formed an active student council under the provision of University Act Section 40(2). It is a representative structure for students only, through which they are involved in the affairs of the college, working in partnership with its management, staff and parents for the benefit of the institute and its students. It worked as an interface between the students and the administration, and helped to consider the issues that affect the students directly and indirectly. The student council in our college represented the interests of the students and participated in discussions and decisions that usually affected the student community throughout the last five years. With an inception of the student council, students have developed their skills of good governance. Students are encouraged to participate and express their views along with the innovative ideas for the various committees of the institution. This student council includes one student from each class who has secured highest number of marks in the Board/University examinations held in the immediately preceding year and he/she is nominated by the Principal. Four other students including two girls have also been nominated by the Principal who basically belong to four essential skills viz. Sports, NSS, NCC and Department of Cultural Activities. However, it is made obligatory for these students to fulfill the eligibility conditions according to provision in Maharashtra University Act Statutes. One of the members of the students' council is elected as a Secretary who represents the college at Shivaji University. The reservation policy for socially backward students has also been considered at the time of formation of Student Council. The term of the student council begins with effect from the date of nomination and extends up to the last day of an Academic year.

During the each academic year since 2011-12, the student council has been engaged in various activities and has worked for several committees at the institution for the benefit of students. The members of the student council have been working in the institutional committees such as '*Students' Redressal Committee, Anti Ragging Committee, Sexual Atrocities Prevention Committee, Ladies Hostel Committee etc.*' under the guidance of the Principal and the other staff. The college organizes regular meetings of Students' Council once in three months. In such meetings the secretary and the other representative members express their views and make the management aware of problems and demands. The Principal along with the faculty and members of students' council suggest remedies over the deficiencies and give a decisive resolution to eradicate them. The student council members also supply a voluntary service in other socio-cultural activities. It works as a motivational force to build a clean, healthy and well cultured society through the camps and activities in NSS and NCC departments.

The contribution of Students' Council is remarkable during the celebration of Annual Prize Distribution Ceremony, Birth Anniversaries of National Heroes, Republic Day, Independence Day, Yoga Day etc. We are proud of having an active, dynamic, and ideal Students' Council at our college.

The institution practices decentralization and participative management

Response:

Yes, the institution has a system whereby decentralization system is implemented. In this system, authority is retained by the top management for taking major decisions and framing policies concerning

the smooth running of the institution. These policies are implemented through participative management.

Members of Governing Council visit the institution for meetings of LMC and IQAC. These members give suggestions/ instructions for carrying out the teaching learning process and the administrative process effectively. Members of Management extend guidance to the institution regarding policies for carrying out academic and infrastructure development. Members of Management also attend functions of the institution such as Annual Prize Distribution Ceremony, seminars, and such important events organized by the institution.

In the year 2014-2015 Department of Commerce organized two day national seminar on "Implementation of Direct Tax Code in India". This is one best case of decentralization and participative management. For this seminar various committees were formed for dissemination of responsibilities to the faculty and the administrative staff. The organizing committee and the Principal entrusted responsibilities to the committees and from time to time a review was taken of the activities undertaken by the various committees. For decision making personal interest, capacity and experience of the teaching and non teaching faculty were taken into consideration. Finally, the Principal gave the necessary suggestions and instructions to these committees. Necessary changes were made in the strategy of deployment of activities, so as to make the activities more fruitful. Thus through the formation of various committees and through the dissemination of responsibilities the objectives of the seminar were communicated and deployed to all levels so as to ensure individual employee's contribution in the overall success of the seminar.

The two day national seminar was arranged in five sessions. In this seminar 125 delegates participated. 58 research papers were presented. For this seminar Dean, faculty of commerce, four BOS Chairmen from different disciplines in commerce faculty of Shivaji University Kolhapur were also present. With the help of teaching non teaching staff, participants and guests the two day national seminar was successfully organized.

The Institution has provided laptops for each department. The Internet facility is provided to the students. Projectors are used in different programmes organized for students and teachers.

7 Faculty Development

Faculty development is promoted through refresher and orientation courses. The faculty participates and present research papers at different levels.

From the above perspective plan of **infrastructure development** activities have been successfully implemented by institution on the basis of strategic plan.

On the basis of strategy, Principal held the meeting of Local Managing Committee (LMC) under Building Committee and discussed about Proposal for **outdoor stadium**. The LMC members approved the proposal. On 20th May, 2011 the proposal was sent to UGC and UGC approved the proposal for construction of the outdoor stadium in our college campus. The institution invited for quotations from willing agencies through daily newspaper. The respective agencies sent their quotations to the institution. The institution approved the quotation given by Prakash Jadhav and Associates.

Under the Local Managing Committee, building committee has played an important role in construction

of Outdoor Stadium. The building committee organized meeting on 30th April, 2011. This committee decided the budget for construction of outdoor stadium. The building committee from time to time supervised the construction of the outdoor stadium.

The total construction of outdoor stadium was Rs. 51, 80,159. The UGC sanctioned an amount of Rs.36, 00,000 and the remaining amount contributed by institution was Rs. 15, 80,159. The total expenditure was verified and audited on 30th December, 2015.

The construction was completed on 2nd November, 2011. At present this outdoor stadium is used optimally by students and even people from the neighboring area.

- Academic performance indicator forms are submitted by faculty at the end of the academic year. These forms are scrutinized by the scrutiny committee. The relevant documents are also submitted.
- Academic diary is maintained by each faculty member every year, which reflects her/his overall performance during the academic year. The entries in the academic diary are verified by the Principal.
- Attendance reports of the students are maintained by the concerned faculty. These reports are submitted by the faculty to the Principal towards the end of the academic year.
- The feedback of the concerned faculty is taken from the students, which is analyzed by a committee that prepares a report of the same. This report is submitted to the Principal and the Principal reviews her / his performance at an interface meeting with the concerned faculty. Rain water harvesting structures and utilization in the campus

Response:

Rainwater is deemed more or less as fresh and cost effective. Pebbles, gravel, sand and charcoal work as natural filter for cleaning the rainwater before usage. Rainwater harvesting is an important environment friendly approach. Such a green practice encouraged in form of Community Development Program can find its popularity when it shows the manifold benefits. Rainwater as well as run-off storm water stored in a planned way can save the earth from soil erosion, flood and recharge the aquifers to increase the level of the decreasing groundwater.

In our institution rain water harvesting is done at two different locations: the Library building and ladies hostel. Rain water that is collected on the terrace of library building is percolated through PVC pipes directed towards the well in the premises. For this topographical survey has proved useful. This helps in maintaining enough storage of water in the well throughout the year. Besides this, the percolation of rain water helps in having good water level in the small stream flowing near the BCA building. This water is utilized for different purposes such as watering the trees, washing vehicles etc. The rain water collected on the terrace of ladies hostel is percolated in the nearby area. This helps to increase ground water level which is useful for agricultural purpose in the premises.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Describe/Explain the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust

Response:

The college is one of the institutions of Kasegaon Education Society's which was established in Ashta in the year 1965. It is located in Semi Urban Area of Sangli. Students from the local and nearby villages are regularly admitted in the college. UG courses for degree programme have been started from the establishment of college. From last twenty years the post graduation courses have also been started in the college. The college has received B grade from NAAC for its good contribution in educational and research activity. In the past, student desirous of PG degree had to go to Kolhapur and Sangli. Now they have this facility in the college as it has five PG programmes.

Besides this, a number of students from the college need coaching for competitive examination. For this purpose the college has an MOU with Netaji Spardha Parixaa Prbhodhini. This has enabled many students from the rural vicinity to take admission to this coaching class. The number of beneficiaries has increased over the years. Our goal is to sustain students in self employment. To achieve this, college has started technical and professional branch of MCVC in 1993. This wing is run under the guidelines of technical department of HSC board. It includes Electronics and Automobile courses which are helpful to students for self-employment. The students who complete these courses are admitted at the graduate level in this college and then they can start their own business. Some such students are doing business of electrical and motor bike maintenance in Ashta.

In 1994 Kasegaon Education Society started Navodit Primary School and High school in this premises. It has proved to be convenient to the poor students from Ashta town and nearby villages. KES started Junior college in college campus. Ashta is known for a number of innovative activities in agricultural area. Against this background the institution decided to begin agricultural branch in this premises. It was necessary to create awareness about changing agricultural scenario in the youth. So, KES started Agricultural Diploma in this premise in 1995. It is affiliated to Mahatma Phule Agricultural University Rahuri (MS). This branch has proved to be useful to farmers and students in this area. They are able to use modern techniques in the agricultural sector. Innovative cultivation pattern of cash crops, vegetables and traditional crops are used by this unit. Students of agricultural division have an opportunity of agro marketing, They sell vegetables in the market and are able to get marketing knowledge through this practice.

In the year 2016 English Medium Primary School was started in the college campus. This provides primary education through English medium. All these branches are being successfully monitored through Arts and Commerce College. Thus the college premises has the facility of education from KG to PG.

The institution continuously reviews its teaching learning process through meetings with the stakeholders. The college has a rich library with an easy access to technology and information retrieval on different issues. Over the years, there has been a remarkable increase in Research oriented activities. A number of workshops, seminars and conferences have been organized and attended by faculty members. 185 research papers have been published in various national and international journals. Seven National conference proceedings and one book have been published by the Institution. The college strives to provide quality education that is student centric. The college has a rich tradition of meritorious students and outstanding sports persons who are felicitated with many sponsored prizes at the Annual Prize Distribution Ceremony. The college plays a pivotal role in organizing a number of extension activities through NSS and NCC and also various sports events.

Concluding Remarks :

The college ensures that its vision and mission is in tune with the curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities that aim at holistic development of the students. With a focus on enhancing employability of students, entrepreneurship and personality development programmes are organized. An alumnus who is successful in a particular field is awarded 'Prerana Puraskar' in the Annual Prize Distribution Ceremony, which helps to motivate the present students to work hard and enhance their performance.

The college continuously takes rigorous efforts to nurture the values of national integration, critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper. The ways and means followed to nurture these values is a part of overall working of the college that is governed by the principles of participation and transparency.
